

However, Hollywood lay 2,690 kilometres to the south. I needed transport and a cheap place to live in, so I bought a second-hand milk truck, which would become my home on wheels.

I thought about Booto. He had spent his life on the wild coast, a free creature. It would be cruel to take him to the dangers of a big city like Los Angeles, and to leave him shut up in a truck, while I did my work. Unwillingly, I decided to leave him behind.

On the day I was leaving, Booto watched me pack. His eyes showed that he was hurt. He cried unhappily, then disappeared. Somehow I found it easier to leave because he was not there. I drove to the south and then, on a bend in the road, I saw him trotting along. He heard the truck coming and turned around but I went straight past him. I didn't trust myself to stop. In the mirror of the truck, I saw him start to run.

I increased my speed but stopped after a kilometre, not knowing what to do, remembering that long, hard winter when he had been my only companion. I heard the sound of little pebbles flying on the road, and there he was. He was tired, panting hard, but his ears were erect and his eyes full of questioning pain.

'Oh, come on then!' was all I could say, as I opened the door. He jumped on to the seat, licked me all over, then dived to the floor behind the seat and curled up out of sight. Together we set off for Hollywood.
