Later, I found that mighty search was being made for the lost pen and I grew frightened at what I had done, but I did not confess. Then the pen was discovered and my guilt proclaimed to the world.

Father was very angry and he gave me a tremendous thrashing. I do not remember bearing any ill-will towards my father because of this punishment. I think I must have felt that it was a just punishment, though
perhaps overdone. Though my admiration and affection for him remained as strong as ever, fear formed a part of them. Not so with my mother. I had no fear of her, for I knew that she would condone everything I did, because of her excessive love for me, I tried to dominate her a little. I saw much more of
her than I did of father. She was petite and short of stature. Soon I was as tall as she was and felt more of an equal with her. I admired her beauty and loved her amazingly.
