
Word Bank: commotion – tears – staggered – instructed – intervened – inspector – mob – offender – beaten to death – rescued – custody.

Throughout my childhood, I constantly dreamed of being an only child – having no one around to fight with, to share with, to grab the remote away from me in the middle of a ‘big game’. I would have the biggest bedroom in the house and be able to talk on the phone as long as I wanted, without being asked a million times whether I had finished with my conversation. However, I was not born an only child; I have an older sister. I have always called my sister ‘Kicki’, instead of her real name, Christie. When I was younger, I had trouble pronouncing the ‘r’ and ‘s’. To this day, she is still ‘Kicki’.

I started playing basketball when I was eight years old. My father was the coach of the team, and my mother kept the score. So my sister, not old enough to stay home alone, was forced to come along and watch my games. I remember looking into the stands for my mother’s approval during games and seeing my sister’s face, confused. It was obvious that she was not thrilled to be there, but she cheered along with the crowd anyway. Her hair was cut short, almost as short as mine, and her teeth stuck out. She was not a very attractive little girl, and she looked more like my older brother than my sister.

After the games, on the car rides home, my parents and I relived every move I had made on the court. My sister sat in the backseat with me in silence, not knowing how or when to enter the conversation. Most nights she came into my room and said, “Good night, Brad. Good game.” I would smile and thank her. I never really took her compliment seriously. I mean, she hardly understood what was going on in the games; she could not possibly know whether I had played well or not.

When I was in high school, I realised what a truly beautiful person my sister was. Everybody knew her and thought highly of her, and I was referred to as ‘Christie’s little brother.’ I was astonished at the person she had become: smart, sweet and beautiful. To me, she was still the ten year old with the boyish look and buck teeth.

I played basketball in high school, and although Christie was not forced to attend my basketball games anymore, she still came every week, cheering me on from the stands. I remember one game in particular, the last game of the season. My sister sat in the stands with a large group of friends. She wore a t-shirt which had large red letters printed on it. The letters formed the words ‘Brad’s Sister’. Suddenly I was embarrassed. However, it was not her presence that embarrassed me. It was the fact that I had never appreciated her support before. She was never embarrassed to be my sister, even though I had been embarrassed to call her that so many years ago. She did not care what anyone thought, and she never had.

I am an only child now; my sister left for college a few months after that last game. I finally have the biggest room in the house and the remote control all to myself. Now that she has gone, I kind of miss having someone to fight with for the phone, and the big bedroom is not all that great anyway. I went to visit her in college for a weekend. As I stood outside her room, waiting for her to come out, a friend of hers walked past me and questioned, “Hey, aren’t you Christie’s brother?” I beamed and said proudly, “Yes, I am. I’m Christie’s brother.”
